# Did you know:

## **Pregnant and breastfeeding women were excluded from the vaccine trials**

New medical products are not usually tested on pregnant women, to avoid harming mothers and babies. This means there is a lack of data about the Covid vaccines' impact on pregnant women and their babies.

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## **The vaccine trials were not complete before pregnant women were offered the vaccine**

The current listed trial end dates are:  
Pfizer: February 2023; Moderna: December 2022; AstraZeneca: February 2023; Janssen (Johnson & Johnson): March 2023; Novavax: June 2023.

The ongoing data from these trials has not been shared openly.

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## **Pfizer did eventually run a trial on pregnant women**

There were just 349 participants, it ran from February 2021 to July 2022, and the results have not yet been shared.

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## **The vaccine ingredients have been shown to leave the injection site and concentrate in the ovaries**

We don't yet know the long-term impact of this – on women or their developing babies. This is a concern because baby girls are born with all the eggs in their ovaries that they will ever have during their reproductive years.

## **Important safety signals are being ignored**

The VAERS COVID Vaccine Adverse Event Reports include almost 5,000 miscarriages. In the UK, the Yellow Card reporting system details over 800 spontaneous abortions. These are just the ones that have been proactively reported.

The UK Government estimates that fewer than 10% of adverse drug reactions are captured.

Thousands of women have reported menstrual changes following Covid vaccination. This must be fully investigated to rule out future harms.

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Informed consent is a critical part of any medical procedure. The benefits must outweigh the risks.

Right now, there is a lack of data proving that Covid vaccines are safe for pregnant women and their babies.

It's safer to wait.
